Fun Facts

Frank Bunker Gilbreth, Sr. (July 7, 1868 – June 14, 1924) was an early advocate of scientific management and a pioneer of motion study, and is perhaps best known as the father and central figure of *Cheaper by the Dozen*. Born in Fairfield, Maine in 1868, to John Hiram and Martha (née Bunker) Gilbreth, had no formal education beyond high school. After high school, he became a bricklayer apprentice and then became a building contractor, an inventor with several patents, and finally a management engineer. He eventually became an occasional lecturer at Purdue University, which houses his papers. He married Lillian Evelyn Moller on October 19, 1904 in Oakland, California; they had 12 children, 11 of whom survived him. Their names were Anne, Mary (1906–1912), Ernestine, Martha, Frank Jr, William, Lillian, Frederick, Daniel, John, Robert and Jane.

Gilbreth discovered his vocation when, as a young building contractor, he sought ways to make bricklaying (his first trade) faster and easier. This grew into a collaboration with his spouse, Lillian Moller Gilbreth, that studied the work habits of manufacturing and clerical employees in all sorts of industries to find ways to increase output and make their jobs easier. He and Lillian founded a management consulting firm, Gilbreth, Inc., focusing on such endeavors.

According to Claude George (1968), Gilbreth reduced all motions of the hand into some combination of 17 basic motions. These included grasp, transport loaded, and hold. Gilbreth named the motions therbligs, "Gilbreth" spelled backwards with the *th* transposed. He used a motion picture camera that was calibrated in fractions of minutes to time the smallest of motions in workers. George noted that the Gilbreths were, above all, scientists who sought to teach managers that all aspects of the workplace should be constantly questioned, and improvements constantly adopted. Their emphasis on the "one best way" and the therbligs predates the development of continuous quality improvement (CQI) (George 1968: 98), and the late 20th century understanding that repeated motions can lead to workers experiencing repetitive motion injuries.

Gilbreth was the first to propose the position of "caddy" (Gilbreth's term) to a surgeon, who handed surgical instruments to the surgeon as called for. Gilbreth also devised the standard techniques used by armies around the world to teach recruits how to rapidly disassemble and reassemble their weapons even when blindfolded or in total darkness.

Gilbreth died of a heart attack on June 14, 1924, at age 55. He was at the Lackawanna railway station in Montclair, New Jersey, talking on a telephone. Lillian outlived him by 48 years.

Director's Notes

Cheaper by the Dozen, at first glance, may appear to be oldfashioned and out of date. After all, who wears silk stockings? In fact, what are silk stockings? Yes, we had to have a lesson with the "younger" generations involved. After explaining that cotton stockings are tights and silk stockings are panty hose (and some needed explanation of panty hose) we were on our way to dissecting the actual themes of the show. It isn't about stockings at all, it's about children growing up and parents letting go and the two coming together in compromise. It is understanding, that you never truly understand each other; but you find common ground because you love each other. These themes are prevalent today in every household with parents and children. It may not be silk stockings we deal with today, but parents and children battle just the same over a need to be heard (both sides). Cheaper by the Dozen will never be old-fashioned or out of date because the issues it deals with, are timeless.

I have directed many shows and worked with numerous adults and children. This cast is one of the best with which I have ever worked. Each individual is polite, respectful, cooperative, supportive and hard working. The entire rehearsal process was easy and enjoyable. At no time did we deal with drama within the drama. How refreshing you all were and I thank each cast member for creating a great production.

Equally enjoyable was the crew of this production. Everyone immediately jumped into his or her role, and I fully trusted all individuals behind the scenes. They are the ones who make the rest of us look so good. Everyone worked crazy and odd hours to pull this together. Volunteering his or her time to hang and program the lights, search and build costumes, design and paint sets, locate props and set pieces and listen to countless sound effects to find just the right one. Thank you!

There are two individuals who deserve extra recognition for their efforts on this production. Dave Pearson, Master Carpenter, is not only talented, but extremely kind, patient and understanding.

Thank you for always being positive and supportive, even when I had no idea what I was doing! Thank you to Nick Slicer. He was more than a stage manager, he was a co-director. Thanks for your countless hours of work on the poster, the program and being the detail guy. You offered humor and honesty to the show.

Thank you to all the parents and family members of the cast crew. It is not easy to be the one left at home, or waiting in the theater for hours, or even the driver of the same route four evenings a week. I appreciate your time, sacrifice and support. Thank you to my family who allows me to be "one of those artist types" a couple times a year.

Seven weeks ago we began with only a script in our hands. We now present a production of characters, costumes, props, set, music, lights and sound effects. We hope you will enjoy all the effort that was made to create an entertaining and memorable show.

A Brief History

In 1947 a group of people gave a performance of "Pure as the Driven Snow" at the Old Masonic Temple on Locust Street in DeKalb. Ann Eddy Gray was the director. The group prevailed upon Ann to form a theater group. They needed a theater space, and Ann went to John Ellwood and persuaded him to let the group use the loft of his big barn on the Ilehamwood Farm on North First Street. John's mother gave the group the use of a stage coach, which became the box office for the players and which gave them a name, the Stage Coach Players.

SCP performed four shows in the Barn that year. They remained at the barn for 3 summers (through 1949) and used various high school auditoriums for the next several years

In 1953 the Stage Coach Players moved into their theatre on Love's Road, a modular metal building. At first the theatre was the only building out on the edge of town. The theatre was without water until 1961, when a well was dug. As the seasons went by, more conveniences were added: dressing rooms, rest rooms, and storage space. Meanwhile residences and businesses grew up all around the theatre. It was decided that a better space was needed, with heating and air conditioning and protection from the elements. In 2001, a new building was acquired at 126 S. 5th Street, which was originally built as the Moose Hall and for 30 years served as home to the Church of Christ in DeKalb. Dedicated SCP members spent many months converting the space into an intimate theatre setting.

Throughout it all, Stage Coach Players has remained true to their legacy: to provide quality live theatre entertainment for all our audiences.
