Director's Notes

In 1980, the comedy movie 9 to 5 was released. It did very well at the box office and is on the American Film Institute's "100 funniest movies" list. 9 to 5 The Musical is based on that movie with music and lyrics by Dolly Parton. The musical opened in Los Angeles in 2008 with a Broadway premier in April of 2009.

When I was asked to direct a show last year I didn't think I was ready but I had been taking steps to prepare for this and thought a nice small comedy play would be fun place to start. I was then asked to direct what is traditionally one of our biggest musicals of the year I and thought someone had mistaken me for someone else.

After giving this offer some consideration, I decided not to direct. But, I was encouraged by several friends who believed in me and made me believe that I actually could do this. It was at that point that I decided to surround myself with some of the best people we have at Stagecoach and forge ahead. I knew that I had not seen half of the things directors are responsible for so I approached Jan Kuntz to act as my mentor through the process. She was hesitant but after our first meeting she not only agreed to this but also to produce my show. I am so lucky that she agreed to this. I know from experience that a show without a producer is a show without a rudder.

Next was to find a stage manager that was strong, organized, and wouldn't have any problem telling me that I was wrong. Jeanna Hunter was a perfect choice for this. I would be buried in all of the details every night at rehearsal if not for her. She keeps me looking at the "Big Picture" when I start to focus too much on the details.

There isn't anyone at our organization that takes the performance of the music more seriously than Judy O'Connor. I was just lucky that her busy schedule allowed her the time to be our musical director. This is musically one of the most difficult scores I have ever seen. She has done a wonderful job preparing the cast.

Being a graphic designer doesn't necessarily mean you are artistic. This is not the case for Wendy Tritt, our set designer, she has had some fantastic ideas that helped me solidify my vision for the show.

One of those things I was totally unprepared for was the number of props needed on stage. Sue McCue and the rest of her properties crew work like a well-oiled machine. I stopped worrying about this after our first meeting.

There are people at Stagecoach that are always there. Willing to do whatever it takes or ready to volunteer their husbands when needed. Susan Johnson is one of those people and I haven't given wardrobe another thought because she agreed to work on the show.

I can't finish without thanking my cast. We struggled to get enough players but I truly feel like this is one of the most talented groups I have ever worked with. At times I wish I was part of the cast myself.

I am beginning to ramble like those silly people at the Academy Awards who need to thank everyone they have ever met since 5th grade. I just want to thank everyone that helped to make this show what it is. It truly is a team effort. Thanks to everyone. Oh, and thanks to all the kids in Mr. Dunlop's 5th grade class!
